Read a short article or text about the Day of the Dead traditions in Mexico.

The Day of the Dead is a famous Mexican holiday celebrated on November 1st and 2nd. It is not a sad day. It is a happy time to remember family and friends who have died. Families believe the spirits of the dead come back to visit during these days.

Families prepare for Día de los Muertos by setting up altars in their homes with gifts for all the loved ones who have passed away. The altars have photos, flowers, candles, and food offerings like "pan de muerto" (bread of the dead), and "calaveras," which are sugar skulls, on the altar. The marigold flower is an important symbol of the holiday.

In many towns and cities, people also go to the cemetery. Many families have picnics in the cemetery and tell stories about the people who have died. It is a time to remember and celebrate their lives. Celebrations also include parades with music and dancing. Many people wear costumes and masks. It is a festive and lively time. People paint their faces like skulls, often called "calacas," with colorful designs.

Día de los Muertos teaches us that death is a part of life. It helps people keep their loved ones in their hearts. It is a holiday full of life, love, and memories.

Glossary

marigold - a bright orange or yellow flower often seen in gardens.

cemetery - a place where people bury the dead.

procession - a group of people moving together in an organized way, often for a special event.

offerings - gifts that people give to show respect or thanks, usually in a ceremony.

altar - a table or flat surface used for religious ceremonies.

skull - the hard part of the head that protects the brain.
